This picture is of Daisy, on Voss Street in Manning.






st This is a picture of my driveway on the farm st

The ground was prepared by spraying the weeds, then scattering the Everlastings three years ago, and they have continued to come back ever since. There is some capeweed appearing now, so only one more year of beautiful flowers, then we will have to control of the weeds again. That would entail spraying everything out in autumn and resowing the entire section with fresh seed.

Tips for Everlasting



Everlastings in a Vase \sim

 Hold the flowerhead in your fingertip
 Slide your fingers down the stem to remove leaves and simply snap at the base
 Place all stems together, evening them up at the flowers
 With secateurs, snip to make the bunch the same height
 Place in a vase and change water regularly
 Pick away droopy or deteriorating flowerheads over their duration



Verge planting!!

Why not plant your verge to everlastings..? It is WATERWISE, EASY-CARE and looks FANTASTIC!!! Start preparing now, by controlling the weeds and having a nice clear area for scattering seeds in April / May. Way to go!!

DOWN ON THE FARM



Here's a pic of our 2022 everlasting crop! Planted late to control the weeds and seeding canola seeding took precedence!! Still needs to be sprayed with a grass selective to remove ryegrass.
